## Personable palette

## Fabric skill

Reynal deftly works magic with fabrics, particularly classic window treatments; in this room they lend a welcome timelessness. Striped Roman shades tie together patterns and accents in the room, such as the rug. The choices make it easy to envision a time the Fletchers will redo the room with other furniture - a bed, a desk - but will be able to maintain the same fabrics.
